

## Myths about Bullying

**THE MYTH:** Bullies suffer from insecurity and low self-esteem. They pick on others to make themselves feel more important

**THE RESEARCH:** Most bullies have average or above average self-esteem. They “suffer” from aggressive temperaments, a lack of empathy, and poor parenting.

**THE MYTH:** Bullies are looking for attention. Ignore them and the bullying will stop.

**THE RESEARCH:** Bullies are looking for control, and they rarely stop if their behavior is ignored. The level of bullying usually increases if the bullying is not addressed by adults.

**THE MYTH:** Boys will be boys.

**THE RESEARCH:** Bullying is seldom outgrown: it’s simply redirected. About 60% of boys identified as bullies in middle school commit at least one crime by the time they are 24.

**THE MYTH:** Kids can be cruel about differences.

**THE RESEARCH:** Physical differences play only a very small role in bullying situations.

Most targets are chosen because they are sensitive, anxious, and unable to retaliate.

**THE MYTH:** Targets of bullies need to stand up for themselves and deal with the situation.

**THE RESEARCH:** Targets of bullies are usually younger or physically weaker than their harassers. They also lack the social skills to develop supportive friendships. They cannot deal with the situation themselves.

**THE MYTH:** Large schools or classes are conducive to bullying.

**THE RESEARCH:** No correlation has been established between class or school size and bullying. In fact, there is some evidence that bullying may be less prevalent in larger schools where potential targets have increased opportunities for finding supportive friends.

**THE MYTH:** Most bullying occurs off school grounds.

**THE RESEARCH:** Although some bullying occurs outside of school or on the way to and from school, most bullying occurs on school grounds, in classrooms, in hallways and on playgrounds.

**THE MYTH:** Bullying effect only a small number of students.

**THE RESEARCH:** At any given time, about 25% of U.S. students are the targets of bullies, and about 20% are engaged in bullying behavior. [The National Association of School Psychologists](#) estimates that 160,000 children stay home from school every day because they are afraid of being bullied.

**THE MYTH:** Teachers know if bullying is a problem in their classes.

**THE RESEARCH:** Bullying behavior usually takes place out of sight of teachers. Most targets are reluctant to report the bullying for fear of embarrassment or retaliation, and most bullies deny or justify their behavior.

**THE MYTH:** Targets of bullying need to follow the adage “Sticks and stones will break your bones, but names can never hurt you.”

**THE RESEARCH:** Targets of bullying often suffer lifelong problems with low self-esteem. They are prone to depressions, suicide, and other mental health problems throughout their lives.
